Item 1: Introduction

COPE CONNELLY is an investment adviser offering advisory accounts and services. Brokerage and investment advisory services and fees differ, and it is important that you understand the differences. This document gives you a summary of the types of services and fees we offer. Item 2: Relationships and Services

Questions to ask us: Given my financial situation, should I choose an investment advisory service? Why or why not? How will you choose investments to recommend to me? What is your relevant experience, including your licenses, education and other qualifications? What do these qualifications mean? What investment services and advice can you provide me?

Our firm primarily offers the following investment advisory services to retail clients: portfolio management (we review your portfolio, investment strategy, and investments); financial planning (we assess your financial situation and provide advice to meet your goals). As part of our standard services, we typically monitor client accounts on a monthly basis. Our firm offers both discretionary advisory services (where our firm makes the decision regarding the purchase or sale of investments) as well as non-discretionary services (where the retail investor makes the ultimate decision). We do *not* limit the types of investments that we recommend. Our firm does *not* have a minimum account size. Please also see our Form ADV Part 2A (“Brochure”), specifically Items 4 & 7.

Cope Connelly manages a related entity, C4M Global Advisors, LLC, which is the investment manager for a hedge fund, C4M SPC – Strategic Relative Value Segregated Portfolio. We have an incentive to recommend investing in this fund, which will lead to financial professionals and/or the firm receiving additional compensation. We manage five private SPV funds for which we receive management fees and/or other compensation. This creates a conflict of interest because we have an incentive to recommend investments or strategies that benefit the fund or increase compensation to our firm. We mitigate these conflicts through written policies, supervision, and fiduciary obligations.

Item 3: Fees, Costs, Conflicts, and Standard of Conduct

Questions to ask us: Help me understand how these fees and costs might affect my investments. If I give you \$10,000 to invest, how much will go to fees and costs, and how much will be invested for me? How might your conflicts of interest affect me, and how will you address them? What fees will I pay?

Our fees vary depending on the services you receive. Additionally, the amount of assets in your account affects our advisory fee; the more assets you have in your advisory account, the more you will pay us and thus we have an incentive to increase those assets in order to increase our fee. Our fixed fee arrangements are based on the amount of work we expect to perform for you, so material changes in that amount of work will affect the advisory fee we quote you. We offer our services on a fee basis. We charge a fixed fee for financial planning and investment consulting. For ongoing financial planning and investment consulting services, the annual fee may be prorated and charged monthly or quarterly. We charge fees based upon assets under management for investment management and wealth management services. For assets managed, the asset-based fees are paid monthly in arrears. The more assets there are in your advisory accounts, the more you will pay in fees. In addition to the advisory fees paid to us, you also incur certain charges imposed by other third parties, such as broker dealers, independent money managers, custodians, etc. These additional charges include securities brokerage commissions, transaction fees, custodial fees, fees attributable to alternative assets, reporting charges, charges imposed directly by a mutual fund or ETF in a client’s account, as disclosed in the fund’s prospectus (e.g., fund management fees and other fund charges). You pay our fees even if you do not have any transactions and the advisory fee paid to us generally does not vary based on the type of investments selected. Some investments (e.g., mutual funds, variable annuities, etc.) impose additional fees (e.g., transactional fees and product-level fees) that reduce the value of your investment over time. The same goes for any additional fees you pay to a custodian. Additionally, you will pay transaction fees, if applicable, when we buy or sell an investment for your account. You will pay fees and costs whether you

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make or lose money on your investments. Fees and costs will reduce any amount of money you make on your investments over time. Please make sure you understand what fees and costs you are paying. Please also see our [Brochure](#) for additional details.

What are your legal obligations to me when acting as my investment adviser? How else does your firm make money and what conflicts of interest do you have?

When we act as your investment adviser, we must act in your best interest and not put our interest ahead of yours. At the same time, the way we make money creates some conflicts with your interests. You should understand and ask us about these conflicts because they can affect the investment advice we provide you. Here are some examples to help you understand what this means:

- Our financial professionals can receive commissions and therefore have an incentive to recommend products that provide them or us additional compensation over those that do not
- For AUM fees, the more assets you have in your advisory account, the more you will pay us and thus we have an incentive to increase those assets in order to increase our fee
- For fixed fees, the more work we expect to perform for you, the higher our fee would be and thus we have an incentive for you to agree to have us complete more work for you

How do your financial professionals make money?

Primarily, we and our financial professionals receive cash compensation from the advisory services we provide to you because of the advisory fees we receive from you. This compensation may vary based on different factors, such as those listed above in this Item. Our financial professionals also have the ability to receive commissions from clients and therefore have an incentive to recommend products that provide them or us additional compensation over those that do not. Moreover, we receive compensation from third parties for recommending certain investments and thus have an incentive to recommend those investments over other choices. Questions to ask us: As a financial professional, do you have any disciplinary history? For what type of conduct? Do you or your financial professionals have legal or disciplinary history?
